MINUTES

A. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by President Mary Blackmon on May 20, 2026, at 8:51 a.m.

B. Roll Call

Members Present: James Beri, Mary Blackmon, Danielle Funderburg, Lynda Jackson, and James Petrie

C. Pledge of Allegiance

D. Approval of Agenda

Member Beri, with support from Member Jackson, moved to approve the agenda as presented. The motion passed with a voice vote of 5-0.

E. Public Participation – No public comments were made.

F. Introduction of New Staff:

G. President's Remarks and Board Comments

Member Petrie thanked the Superintendent, Dr. Daveda Colbert, and staff for coordinating recent Board visits to South Redford and Ecorse schools. He noted the opportunity to observe a variety of student programs, including graphic design and cosmetology, and highlighted the enthusiasm and engagement demonstrated by students and staff.

Member Petrie also recognized Wayne RESA's recent board recognition award received at the MASB Awards Ceremony and commended the event organizers. In addition, he highlighted the graduation ceremony for participants in Wayne RESA's partnership with Eastern Michigan University, celebrating 36 graduates who completed programs designed to support paraprofessionals in advancing toward teaching careers. He praised the initiative's success and acknowledged the leadership and collaboration that contributed to its positive impact.

Member Funderburg shared observations from the Board's visit to Ecorse High School, highlighting the value of career and technical education programs that provide students with skills and experiences aligned to future career opportunities. She noted the strong student engagement and enthusiasm displayed throughout the visit.

Member Funderburg expressed particular interest in the school's aviation and drone program, where students demonstrated their knowledge of drone operations and aviation fundamentals, including hands-on flight experiences. She also highlighted the variety of career-focused programs available to students, including graphic design, radio and television production, automotive technology, cosmetology, certified

nursing assistant (CNA), and phlebotomy programs. She remarked on the students' excitement about their future opportunities and their eagerness to learn.

Member Beri shared reflections from the Board's visit to Ecorse High School, noting the wide range of career and technical education opportunities available to students despite the school's relatively small enrollment. He highlighted programs such as cosmetology, aviation, and other career-focused offerings that provide students with opportunities to earn credentials and prepare for future careers. He noted the strong student engagement, positive interactions with students and staff, and the school's commitment to providing meaningful hands-on learning experiences and career pathways for students.

Member Jackson reported on her attendance at the National Alliance of Black School Educators (NABSE) Midwest Regional Conference in Columbus, Ohio, where she observed recognition of outstanding educators, including Superintendent and Teacher of the Year award recipients. She shared highlights from keynote speaker Amen Rahh, founder of University Pathways Public Service Academy in the Los Angeles Unified School District, and presentations focused on educational leadership, student achievement, and expanding opportunities for students from underserved communities.

Member Jackson also shared information from conference sessions on the use of artificial intelligence (AI) in education, including strategies for engaging educators, families, and community stakeholders in discussions about emerging technologies. Additionally, she highlighted opportunities for students interested in medical and aviation careers, including scholarship programs, workforce development initiatives, and projected workforce needs in high-demand industries.

President Blackmon reported on her attendance at the NAACP Freedom Fund Dinner, which featured remarks by Congressman Hakeem Jeffries and recognized civil rights pioneer Ruby Bridges, along with numerous community leaders and organizations. She noted the strong attendance and broad representation of honorees from a variety of fields, recognized for their contributions to improving communities throughout Detroit and Michigan.

President Blackmon shared that Central High School recently honored former Detroit City Council Member and State Representative Joanne Watson by dedicating a street in her name, recognizing her public service and community impact.

President Blackmon also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

- **DPSCD** – Congratulations to Detroit Public Schools Community District students who participated in the Aspen Challenge. All 23 DPSCD high schools competed to address real community issues, including substance abuse, food insecurity, and mental health. Students presented powerful, student-driven solutions to these challenges. Congratulations to Detroit International Academy for Young Women and Henry Ford High School, whose winning projects earned them the opportunity to present on a national stage in Aspen, Colorado.
- **Ecorse** – Congratulations to the Ecorse High School aviation program students who recently visited the Tuskegee Airmen National Historical Museum at Detroit City Airport. During the visit, students observed aircraft operations and participated in discovery flights, where they had the opportunity to take control of the aircraft and experience flying firsthand. Ninth-grade students in the CTE Aviation Program shared that the experience was both inspiring and impactful during our Board of Education visit last week.

- **Grosse Pointe** – Congratulations to Grosse Pointe North students who brought their A-game to the University of Michigan German Day competition. Several students earned 2026 awards, including: 1st Place – Andrew G. and Jack B.; 2nd Place – Sophia Z., Thomas S., and Jaxx D.; and 3rd Place – Tiara W. Congratulations on this outstanding achievement.
- **Plymouth-Canton** – Congratulations to Plymouth-Canton middle school social studies teachers and students on an impressive showing at the 2026 Regional Civics Bee. Students dominated the competition, with Madhu R. of East Middle School earning first place in the regional event. Kudos to these outstanding scholars and their educators.
- **South Redford** – Congratulations to South Redford Career Technical Education students who proudly represented their district at Build Detroit, held May 7 at Eastern Market. Students competed in Construction and Welding, showcasing their talent, teamwork, and creativity. We had the opportunity to meet several of these students during our Board of Education visit in April and congratulate them on their accomplishments.
- **Woodhaven-Brownstown** – Congratulations to Woodhaven’s Goon Squad Robotics Team 3604, which has advanced to the FIRST World Championship in Houston following a historic performance at the Michigan State Championship. The team ranked fifth on its field and earned its third consecutive State-Level Impact Award, the highest honor in the program. We wish these talented scholars the very best as they prepare to compete against the world’s top robotics teams in Texas.

H. Communications – No communications were received.

I. Special Presentations

1. **Growing Opportunity: Wayne RESA Early Childhood Services Update** - Dez’arae Adams and Kristi Collyer, Directors of Early Childhood; and Early Childhood Consultants D’Anna Courtney-Rives, Noel Sauer, and Cynthia Ulmer, provided an update on Wayne RESA Early Childhood Services, highlighting continued growth in the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP), expansion plans for the 2026–2027 school year, professional learning initiatives focused on PBIS, literacy, and mathematics, and the opening of the Wayne RESA Early Childhood Center in Inkster.

J. Superintendent’s Report

Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis

Mr. Latvis provided an update on state budget and legislative activity, reporting that both the House and Senate budget proposals include increased funding for K–12 education and reduce proposed transfers from the School Aid Fund to higher education. He noted that all current budget proposals include a foundation allowance increase to \$10,300 per pupil, with the Senate proposal offering additional flexibility for districts experiencing enrollment declines through a three-year student count averaging option. Mr. Latvis expressed optimism that a state budget will be completed by the July 1 deadline, while acknowledging that final negotiations remain ongoing.

Budget Highlights:

- The Senate budget includes weighted funding recommendations aligned with School Finance Research Collaborative priorities, including supports for at-risk students and English learners.
- Proposed increases for Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP)/PreK for All and literacy initiatives remain included in budget discussions.
- Revenue projections indicate the School Aid Fund is expected to grow more slowly than inflation, creating long-term funding challenges for schools.

- The Senate budget incorporates language changes advocated by Wayne RESA regarding Section 31aa school safety funding. Proposed revisions would maintain state investigations following mass casualty events while removing requirements that districts waive certain legal privileges, making participation more accessible for districts.

Property Tax Discussions:

- Mr. Latvis reported ongoing discussions regarding proposed property tax reforms that could impact school funding and municipal revenues. He emphasized the importance of ensuring any tax relief proposals include sustainable and fully funded replacement revenues before implementation.

Legislative Activity:

- Limited education policy activity is occurring as lawmakers focus primarily on budget negotiations.
- The proposed LETRS literacy training mandate remains under discussion, though momentum has slowed, and concerns regarding implementation and flexibility continue to be raised.
- Additional education-related proposals, including school rating systems and third-grade retention measures, are expected to be reintroduced but are currently viewed as unlikely to advance.

Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services, Beth Gonzalez

Ms. Gonzalez highlighted several recent initiatives and accomplishments across the Educational Services Division. She reported that Wayne RESA celebrated the 2025–26 cohort of the Wayne Future Leaders Initiative, recognizing 15 aspiring school leaders, and announced a new partnership with Grand Valley State University that will allow participants to earn up to six graduate credit hours toward administrator certification or a master’s degree in educational leadership.

Ms. Gonzalez also shared that Educational Services consultants recently conducted instructional learning walks at Ecorse High School and Detroit Academy of Arts and Sciences to support partnership district improvement efforts using the GLEAM (Grade-Level, Engaging, Affirming, and Meaningful) instructional framework. Additional highlights included the successful fourth annual Backpacks to Briefcases career exploration event, which engaged more than 200 Wayne County eighth-grade students, and the Tri-County Meaningful Mathematics and STEM Showcase, which welcomed approximately 1,200 middle and high school students from Wayne, Oakland, and Washtenaw counties. She further noted the launch of an OpenSciEd middle school science curriculum initiative, highlighting significant science proficiency gains achieved through the pilot implementation in Allen Park Public Schools.

Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl reported that Wayne RESA reached a tentative two-year agreement with Local 1882, the support staff bargaining unit, effective July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2028. Key provisions include alignment of the holiday schedule with the Wayne County Common Calendar, increased tuition reimbursement benefits, clarification of health insurance language related to potential changes in state funding requirements, a ratification bonus, guaranteed step increases for eligible employees, and off-schedule compensation adjustments tied to future funding increases. The agreement was ratified by the union on May 13 and was presented to the Board for consideration.

Ms. Bohl also shared that Wayne RESA received a favorable ruling from the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals in a special education class action case involving the Michigan Department of Education. The ruling affirmed the requirement that special education disputes proceed through established IDEA due process procedures before seeking federal court intervention. Board members received additional information regarding the complaint resolution options available to parents, including state complaints, due process hearings, and federal Office for Civil Rights complaints, as well as the procedural safeguards provided to families during the IEP process.

Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert

Dr. Colbert shared:

- The month of May continues to fill hearts with gratitude, pride, and deep appreciation as National Teacher Appreciation Week was recognized at the beginning of the month. Appreciation was extended for the Board’s powerful tribute recognizing the unwavering dedication, brilliance, and impact of Wayne County educators while affirming and celebrating the work of teachers and educators from our constituent districts, and our amazing team members throughout Wayne RESA. The tribute was forwarded to each school district following approval at the previous board meeting, and many expressed appreciation for the thoughtful language and recognition included in the message.
- Educators build futures, change trajectories, and make a lasting difference daily. Appreciation was extended to teachers and educators across Wayne County, the region, the state, and the nation for the impact they continue to make. Teachers and educators were recognized as heroes who are exactly what students need during this moment, and encouragement was shared to continue celebrating them throughout the year.
- RESA continues to emphasize that there is an outstanding educator inside each individual serving and supporting students. Educators work behind the scenes, lead from the front, and serve with excellence. Excellence remains the operating standard and is embedded in RESA’s culture and DNA. And with that, we continue to shape the lives of each of the scholars in Wayne County every single day, in every way in which we contribute to their lives and to their learning.
- Wayne RESA celebrated its own staff during the annual “Hour of Power” luncheon on Monday, May 4. The event provided an intentional opportunity to pause, connect, and celebrate staff dedication, passion, and excellence while continuing to strengthen organizational culture. Emphasis was placed on the importance of intentionally investing in and celebrating workplace culture.
- National Nurses Week was also recognized, beginning with National Nurses Day on May 6 and continuing through May 12. Appreciation was extended to Wayne RESA’s school nurses and the Safe and Healthy Schools team for their professionalism, dedication, and daily impact across both the county and the organization. The team was acknowledged as a tremendous asset and true difference-makers whose impact is felt each and every day.
- On Friday, May 8, Wayne RESA welcomed more than 200 eighth-grade students from five schools across Wayne County to the “Backpacks to Briefcases: Your Future on Purpose” event held at the Ted Scott Campus of Wayne County Community College District. Participating schools included Garden City Middle School, Lincoln Park Middle School, Canton Preparatory Academy, David Ellis Academy, and Detroit Academy of Arts and Sciences. This was the largest student participation to date. Appreciation was extended to the Workforce Development team and all Wayne RESA volunteers who supported the event. Students participated in engaging hands-on experiences, visited college classrooms and programs, and interacted with professionals from multiple industries.
 - This event intentionally aligns with Michigan’s 60 by 30 initiative, which aims to increase the percentage of working-age adults with a college degree or skill certificate to 60 percent by the year 2030. The experience was intentionally designed for eighth-grade students to expose them early to career pathways and workforce opportunities. Plans are already underway for next year’s event at the Ted Scott Campus.
 - Participating partners included a pilot from Delta Air Lines, and representatives from Michigan Public Health Institute, Michigan State Police, Dearborn Fire Department, Detroit Police Department, Henry Ford College, Schoolcraft College, IBEW Local 58, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and South Redford School District Career Technical Education representatives. High school CTE students also shared their personal experiences with participants during the event.
 - Appreciation was extended to the Communications team for capturing video footage and supporting coordination efforts that will assist in future promotion and outreach.

- Continued encouragement was shared for families to enroll four-year-olds in Wayne RESA's Pre-K program. The importance of early childhood education and participation in research-based programs was emphasized, sharing that we have exemplary programs across the county that are accepting enrollment, as well as the excitement surrounding the new teacher training lab model and the classrooms that will open at the Wayne RESA Early Childhood Center. Families were encouraged to apply regardless of income, with reminders that all four-year-old Michigan residents are eligible for enrollment opportunities.
- Recognition was also shared for RESA's Years of Service and Retirement Celebration and Memorial Acknowledgment, taking place following the board meeting on May 20. The event honors years of service, meaningful contributions, and the lasting legacies of individuals who have impacted Wayne RESA and Wayne County communities.
- An update was provided regarding a recent water main break at the Annex. Appreciation was extended to the Building Services and Operations teams for their intentional work in responding to and monitoring the situation. The Annex was temporarily closed for two days to ensure staff safety, and teams relocated to the Education Center during repairs and continued monitoring efforts.
- Additional campus updates were shared regarding infrastructure improvements, including preparation for a new generator that will support our technology infrastructure and ensure continuity during power outages. Updates were also provided regarding landscaping improvements, including grass restoration and the planting of native trees to maintain a safe, aesthetically pleasing, and welcoming campus.
- Dr. Colbert closed by acknowledging the many positive initiatives and celebrations taking place across Wayne County and encouraged continued momentum and pride in the work being done throughout the county. A lot of great things are happening. Let's continue creating memorable experiences, engaging opportunities, meaningful work, and clear evidence of impact. Let's go, Wayne County!

The motion passed with a voice vote of 5-0.

M. General Board Comments

Member Petrie shared excitement about honoring the RESA employees for years of service and retirements during the upcoming celebration.

Member Jackson shared highlights from a recent Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) event, including a visit to Wayne County Community College District and a tour showcasing student programs and workforce development initiatives. She expressed appreciation for the opportunities available to students and noted her enthusiasm for seeing program participants transition into the workforce.

President Blackmon added that attendees participated in a guided tour highlighting Detroit’s history and key community sites. She also noted the opportunity to visit Wayne County
