A. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by Vice President Danielle Funderburg on October 15, 2025, at 8:35 a.m.

G. President's Remarks and Board Comments

Member Petrie expressed appreciation to Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert and the administration for coordinating attendance at the Shining Light Awards in Detroit. He shared that the event was uplifting and inspiring, highlighting the recognition of John Perkins, Jr. (Dave Bing Young Leader Award), Lisa Johanon (Eleanor Josaitis Unsung Hero Award), and Dr. Curtis Ivery (Neal Shine Exceptional Regional Leadership Award). Member Petrie commended the honorees for their perseverance and contributions to improving Detroit and the regional community, noting

that he and his wife greatly enjoyed attending the event.

Member Jackson thanked administration for arranging attendance at the Shining Light Awards, noting how inspiring and emotional the event was. She highlighted John Perkins's heartfelt speech upon receiving the Dave Bing Award, as well as the touching stories shared by Lisa Johanon and Dr. Curtis Ivery, who she proudly noted is from her home state of Arkansas.

Member Jackson also shared reflections from attending the Western Wayne Business Leadership Banquet, where Carhartt CEO Linda Hubbard spoke about the company's brand and advertising. She added that the evening's moderator brought humor to the event, making it an enjoyable and memorable experience.

Vice President Funderburg shared reflections from attending the Western Wayne Business Leadership Banquet, highlighting remarks from Linda Hubbard of Carhartt. She noted that Hubbard spoke about the importance of branding and how the Carhartt brand has become a symbol of quality and reliability, often appearing in films and media without paid product placement. Vice President Funderburg found the discussion both inspiring and insightful, noting Carhartt's long legacy, over 130 years in business.

Vice President Funderburg also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

- **Allen Park** - Congratulations to Allen Park School Board Member, Mike Klein, on being the recipient of the 2025 Heart of Michigan Science Teacher Association (MTSA) Award. In addition to being a valued member of the Allen Park Board of Education, Mr. Klein retired from the Macomb ISD as a science consultant, director of the Macomb Math and Science Center, and regional director of the Michigan STEM Network.
- **DPSCD** – Congratulations to Detroit Public Schools Community District, which unveiled an 11,000-square-foot career technical education annex at Southeastern High School, designed to provide students with hands-on experience in trades and advanced manufacturing. The new facility features a welding lab, computer numerical control lab, and collaborative learning areas aimed at giving students real-world opportunities beyond traditional classroom learning.
- **Northville** - Congratulations to Srihan S., a junior at Northville High School, for winning the 2025 Gloria Barron Prize for Young Heroes. He developed a low-cost, scalable system that captures and degrades microplastics from water, a breakthrough that could change how we clean up our rivers, lakes, and drinking water.
- **Plymouth-Canton** – Congratulations to Plymouth-Canton International Baccalaureate Teacher Casey Swanson. Mr. Swanson has been awarded the prestigious Jean Ramseyer Award for Excellence in Teaching and Learning by the International Baccalaureate Schools of Michigan (IBSOM). This statewide honor recognizes just one educator each year for their leadership, dedication, and impact on advancing IB education in Michigan.
- **Wayne-Westland** – Congratulations to the William D. Ford Career-Technical Center Digital Photography & Media Students. Their achievements include:
 - A Gold Medal Scholastic Art Award at Carnegie Hall in NYC. Their work was exhibited at the Scholastic Headquarters and placed in the top 1% of submissions nationwide.
 - A second-place finish in the National SkillsUSA Photography Competition.

- A 1st Place win in the 12th District Congressional Art Competition and traveled to Washington, D.C., where their piece will be displayed in the Congressional Walkway for one year.

President Blackmon expressed sadness over the passing of former U.S. Representative Carolyn Cheeks Kilpatrick, noting her many outstanding accomplishments as both a state legislator and a member of Congress. She shared that the loss feels personal, having known Congresswoman Kilpatrick for many years, and extended heartfelt condolences while wishing her a peaceful transition. President Blackmon acknowledged that Congresswoman Kilpatrick will be honored in many venues for her lasting impact and dedicated public service.

H. Communications – No communications were submitted to the Board.

I. Special Presentations

1. Literacy Momentum: Strengthening Systems, Sustaining Gains

Executive Director Mari Treece and Director Michelle Wagner presented an overview of Wayne RESA's summer learning initiatives designed to enhance literacy and sustain student achievement across the county. The presentation highlighted the Summer Literacy Labs and Boys College Summer Literacy Institute. Data from pre- and post-assessments demonstrated measurable gains in key literacy skills. The presentation also detailed the Countywide Coaching Network, noting that over 15,000 hours of direct coaching had been provided to educators, a 75% increase in student proficiency on selected goals, and successful collaboration among 51 Literacy COSAs and 33 Mathematics COSAs.

2. Fall 2025 Wayne County Data Presentation

Presenters Beth Gonzalez, Deputy Superintendent; Dr. Joseph Musial, Assessment/Evaluation Consultant; and Cindy Taraskiewicz, Instruction and Assessment Consultant, provided an overview of Wayne County's 2024–25 student performance data, including accountability metrics, testing results, graduation rates, enrollment, and attendance. The report showed that Wayne County improved in 15 of 20 state assessments, with notable gains in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science. ELA proficiency rose across nearly all grade levels, and mathematics showed upward trends in most grades, with stronger year-over-year growth than the state average. Science proficiency also improved, particularly at the eighth-grade level. The presentation also highlighted an increase in the county's graduation rate for the third consecutive year, with 62% of high schools exceeding the state average, while chronic absenteeism declined by 2.9% overall.

J. Superintendent's Report

Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis

Mr. Latvis reported on the following:

Budget and Legislative Updates –

- A new state budget was finalized following a brief government shutdown of 1–2 days. While the passage avoided a prolonged disruption, the process lacked transparency and created significant challenges for districts already months into their fiscal year.
- The foundation allowance increased to \$10,050 per pupil.
 - Positive inclusions: 25% increases in both at-risk and English language learner

(ELL) funding; continued support for school meal programs; and one-time educator compensation funding of \$203 million (requiring district-union bargaining).

- Concerns include reduced and restructured school safety and mental health funding, and districts being required to waive legal privilege to access school safety and mental health grants, raising insurance and liability issues.

Next Steps and Local Updates –

- Wayne RESA is coordinating with legal counsel, insurance providers, and MDE to interpret new boilerplate language and grant eligibility requirements.
- Discussions continue regarding potential supplemental budget action to address problematic provisions.
- Upcoming event: Wayne County Association of School Boards General Membership Meeting—dinner/networking at 5:45 p.m., meeting begins at 6:00 p.m., featuring Brian Galdes speaking on youth suicide prevention and a legislative update from RESA leadership.

Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services, Beth Gonzalez

Ms. Gonzalez shared the following update:

- An upcoming event titled “Count It Out” will be held on Thursday, October 30, at Wayne RESA with two sessions: 1:30–3:30 p.m. or 4:30–6:30 p.m. The event will feature a film screening that addresses current mathematics performance trends and strategies to improve student outcomes—directly connected to recently presented subgroup data and the county’s improvement vision. A panel discussion will follow, featuring:
 - Dr. Macy Golston (University of Michigan) – advocate for culturally responsive math instruction.
 - Dr. Jennifer Banks (Washtenaw ISD) – leader in tri-county culturally sponsored mathematics initiatives.
 - Brian Manning (Assistant County Executive/CFO, Wayne County Executive’s Office) – supporter of Wayne RESA’s math coaching initiatives and related funding.

Board members were encouraged to attend as the event highlights ongoing countywide efforts to strengthen mathematics instruction and sustain long-term support for math coaching programs.

Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl shared the following updates:

- The board is being asked to adopt for final reading the revisions to board policy and administrative regulations. These updates are primarily editorial in nature, including changes to federal office addresses for Title-related complaints following recent office closures. Additionally, the revisions formally document that employee salary schedules for non-bargaining staff are board-approved schedules rather than informally generated structures.
- Pre- and post-training data from the Orange Frog Happiness Advantage initiative shows positive outcomes for Wayne RESA staff. Results indicate increased optimism, well-being, and resilience, with employees reporting lower levels of frustration, burnout, and emotional fatigue, as well as a quicker recovery from stress. In the areas of meaning and engagement, more staff reported finding purpose in their work, recognizing their strengths, and feeling excited to come to work. Happiness and loyalty scores rose notably, reflecting greater self-rated happiness and workplace satisfaction. While fatigue and burnout remain areas for continued improvement, the data affirms that employees are experiencing meaningful progress.

Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, Drew McMechan

Mr. McMechan shared the following update:

- The financial audit is nearing completion, with all outstanding auditor inquiries resolved and the open items list now cleared. The finance team anticipates finalizing and reviewing the financial statements by the end of the week in preparation for distribution. The audit process has proceeded smoothly, with no significant issues reported.
 - The board will select a date for a study session to review the audit results that will be presented during the November meeting. Following that presentation, the focus will shift from audit-related matters to budget planning discussions in the coming months.

Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert

Dr. Daveda Colbert shared:

- RESA continues to keep Wayne County school communities lifted and encouraged and remains steadfast in its advocacy for resources and adequate school funding. Every student deserves to feel safe in their educational spaces, to be excited about their learning experiences, and to be motivated to thrive and become the best version of who they desire to be.
- There continues to be anxiety and anger surrounding the senseless violence that impacts our communities and, far too often, our schools. Appropriate and sustained funding for school safety and mental health is not optional; it is essential. Everyone has a responsibility to continue to advocate at the highest level for adequate and equitable funding, while also encouraging students and families: if you see something, say something. School safety is strongest when trusted relationships are established among students and between students and staff, and when systems are in place to report and address concerns immediately.
- RESA will continue to educate and empower families to connect every four-year-old in Wayne County with the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP). As evidenced by data, it is imperative that the youngest learners enter formal schooling and experience a high-quality, research-based early learning program that develops cognitive, social, and emotional skills, fosters creativity, and prepares them for kindergarten. Seats are available across the county, and RESA is working diligently to ensure families in all 43 communities are aware of this opportunity.
- RESA continues to emphasize the importance of on-time, regular daily attendance. As evidenced by data, chronic absenteeism has a significant cost; there is a loss of valuable learning that cannot easily be recovered. Students who attend school consistently gain more from their educational experience and are more likely to succeed academically, socially, and emotionally. In partnership with local districts, it is evident that chronic absenteeism is declining in Wayne County.
- Moving forward, RESA will continue to partner with districts to provide evidence and share stories of the impact of public education and what is happening in Wayne County. The focus on awareness, exposure, and experiences continues to connect students to a range of career pathways. It is inspiring to see students light up when exploring opportunities in construction trades, welding, nursing, aviation, and many other fields. RESA will continue to partner with our constituents and lean into those opportunities while also supporting college-bound students to ensure they are prepared for success.
- As highlighted during the Wayne County Data Presentation, Wayne County has many successes to celebrate as well as clearly identified areas for continued improvement.

- Wayne County demonstrated broad academic gains across multiple subjects, including English Language Arts, mathematics, and social studies.
- Data showed improvements in 15 of the 20 assessments, with several grade levels approaching pre-pandemic proficiency levels.
- Wayne County students are outpacing the state in improvement trends, as evidenced by the data.
- Graduation rates in Wayne County continue to rise, while chronic absenteeism rates are steadily declining.

Together, these outcomes reflect Wayne County's unwavering commitment to supporting students academically, socially, and emotionally. The Wayne County Literacy Promise is one example of how partners are working together to ensure equitable literacy outcomes in every community.

- Similarly, RESA's Math COSA initiative is transforming mathematics instruction, with the support of the Wayne County Executive Office, demonstrating the county's shared commitment to academic excellence. Wayne RESA continues to lean into its mission of leading learning for all.
- At the federal level, in March 2025, the U.S. Department of Education laid off approximately 1,300 employees, nearly half of its workforce. In October, an additional 466 staff members received reduction-in-force notices, further impacting key offices overseeing special education, civil rights, and federal funding for vulnerable students. As a result, the department's total workforce declined from over 4,100 employees at the start of the year to fewer than 2,000. Reductions to the U.S. Department of Education are impacting Wayne RESA, Wayne County, and the agency's ability to provide support.
 - Data shows an increase in state complaints and accountability requirements, which will continue to impact operations. RESA assesses impact and recognizes that it may need to explore additional staffing in certain areas, particularly special education and early intervention, as responsibilities shift from federal to state and now to intermediate levels. Accordingly, budget shifts may occur due to these changes and RESA's continued commitment to its mission, vision, and support.
- While RESA is thankful that Michigan now has a state budget in place, there are significant concerns about the loss of funding in several critical areas.
 - MiSTEM funding was reduced, which affects supports around literacy initiatives and programs that improve student outcomes. The loss does not mean Wayne County will abandon these initiatives; however, RESA will need to evaluate support models, adjust, and potentially use portions of fund balance to sustain key programs.
 - Early childhood block grants including Great Start Collaborative funding were also cut. These are critical programs, and RESA remains committed to the partnership and the work, therefore, support will be provided to ensure the partnership remains in place for now.
 - Alternative education funding was also reduced, impacting district programs and requiring RESA to evaluate the impact on our service model.
 - These cuts are tangible and will have lasting effects on schools and communities. RESA will continue to assess these impacts moving forward.
 - Broader conversations are also needed regarding Michigan's overall school funding model, including revisiting Proposal A, examining shifts of dollars to higher education, and addressing the long-term sustainability of K-12 investments.
- Wayne RESA remains deeply committed to leading learning for all and serving as a model of service, leadership, collaboration, and excellence. RESA is proud to serve as a model of exceptional service in Wayne County, across the State of Michigan, and throughout the nation.

- Special thanks were extended to the Wayne RESA Board of Education and entire Wayne RESA family for continued leadership, partnership, and support of the organization and, most importantly, for the support of Wayne County's students and families. Together, we will continue to be the change we want to see in the world.

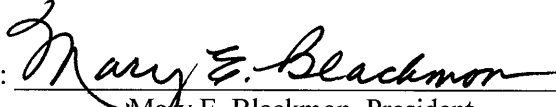
