Regular Meeting January 22, 2025

MINUTES

A. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by President James Petrie on January 22, 2025, at 8:32 a.m.

B. Roll Call

C. Pledge of Allegiance

D. Approval of Agenda

Member Beri, supported by Member Blackmon, moved to approve the agenda as presented. On voice vote, the motion carried 4-0.

E. Public Participation - None.

F. Introduction of New Staff

Kelly Bohl, Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, introduced and provided a brief introduction for the following new hires and internal movements. The Board welcomed new staff members to Wayne RESA and congratulated employees on new positions.

G. President's Remark and Board Comments

Member Funderburg raised concerns about things happening on the federal level and highlighted RESA's ability to be agile and flexible.

Member Funderburg also shared that she was able to participate in a youth engagement event to create awareness about SEMCOG's initiatives for students such as interviewing skills and resume building. SEMCOG also shared information about other work they engaged in including how to protect the water, transportation, the ecosystem, parks and recreation and governmental awareness.

Member Blackmon shared concerns about what will happen with education on the national level and the direction of the current administration, but she is confident that RESA will do everything we can to protect our students and protect education locally.

President Petrie shared highlights from the ribbon cutting at the new Beacon Treatment Center in Taylor, Michigan. Board members had the opportunity to be part of the ribbon-cutting and tour the transformative building in December, before it opened to students on January 6, 2025. President Petre was able to talk to parents and staff who were excited about the facility. One parent noted that it was wonderful and rewarding to see a new facility with brand new equipment and furniture for the students and was moved by the fact that this was happening for her child. Kudos to Superintendent, Dr. Daveda Colbert, RESA Leadership and everyone who contributed to the opening of the new Beacon School.

President Petrie also spoke to the uncertainty happening on the national level, even with the Department of Education, but noted that RESA's mission is clear, goals have been established, and they include giving every student in Wayne County the best possible education and every opportunity to make sure they are successful in life. That is RESA's North Star and what the organization believes in and will continue to work towards.

President Petrie also acknowledged the passing of former President Jimmy Carter noting that he was the president who started the U.S. Department of Education and recognizing his dedication to human rights. President Carter was an outstanding citizen.

Member Blackmon lifted one of President Carter's most outstanding attributes, his strong commitment to public education.

President Petrie also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

- **Crestwood** Congratulations to Crestwood who celebrated the ribbon-cutting at the Crestwood Early Childhood Center the week of January 6th.
- **Ecorse** Congratulations to the staff at both Bunche Elementary and Grandport Academy for being recognized for their academic progress during 2023-24 school year by the Michigan Department of Education.
- Plymouth-Canton Congratulations to Gallimore Elementary's 'Aspiring Scientists'
 team for winning 2nd place in the Michigan Girls Future Flight Challenge. The statewide
 competition encourages 4th-8th grade girls to explore STEM. The team earned a \$600
 prize for their innovative Doctor Drone, which delivers medical supplies and performs
 emergency tasks with GPS autonomy.
 - Also, congratulations to the Gallimore Elementary School for being ranked the No. 1 elementary school in Michigan, for the second year in a row, according to U.S. News and World Report. Kudos to the district and Gallimore students and staff for this outstanding accomplishment.
- Redford Union Congratulations to Redford Union senior Ivan Mendez on his 100th career wrestling win as a Redford Union High School Panther.
 Also, congratulations to Redford Union School District who in December welcomed its newest team members, six wonderful therapy dogs: Moon, Raffi, Gracie, Teddy, Miggy, and Desmond. The well-trained pups are ready to bring joy, comfort and a happy tail wag to the students and staff.

H. Communications – None.

I. Presentations

- 1. Wayne RESA School Board Recognition Dr. Colbert acknowledged January as National School Board Recognition month and gave a tribute to the Wayne RESA Board of Education for their dedication, leadership and advocacy. The Board was recognized for over 100 years of collective service representing 43 communities, 33 local education agencies and 97 public school academies and nearly 260,000 students in Wayne County.
- 2. Technology Update Cyber Security and Local Districts Chad Rider, Director of Technology; Bobby Hodges, Network Architect; and Nickolas Holmes, Lead Technology Consultant presented information on cybersecurity threats and initiatives including CrowdStrike Security, secure remote access and incident response resources. They also provided an overview of local district field service operations including districts covered, key responsibilities, recent projects/highlights and the vision for future support.

J. Superintendent's Report

Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis

Mr. Latvis shared the following updates:

- Legislative Session The Senate passed approximately 110 bills; the Speaker withheld nine bills.
 - The bill with changes to PA152 was one of the nine bills withheld and there are concerns over financial implications for districts.
- House Committees New Education and Workforce committee formation and member assignments are expected soon.
- Advocacy There is a continued push for full funding of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and monitoring of federal funding impacts on Title I, IDEA and other programs.
- Governor Whitner will deliver the State of the State address on Wednesday, February 26, 2025.

Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services, Beth Gonzalez

Ms. Gonzalez did a page-by-page review of the 2024 Wayne County Improvement Data document issued to the Board, which provides a preliminary Partnership District benchmark review status by school. The document noted decrease in early warning Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) buildings in Wayne County from 94 to 79, showing a positive trend. It also identified the reduction in the number of Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) schools from 31 to 22, indicating improved subgroup performance.

A full presentation of Wayne County data will be presented at the February regular board meeting.

Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl shared the following updates:

- Effective February 21, 2025, the Michigan Earned Sick Time Act (ESTA) (is expected to go into effect. If the law does not change, administration will present employment contract amendments to the Board in an effort to maintain the current level of benefits and ensure compliance with the ESTA.
- Happiness Advantage | Orange Frog was recommended by the Wayne RESA Labor-

Management Coalition (L-MC), comprised of leadership team and union leaders, to support the organization goal of fostering a healthy workplace culture where individuals are motivated, engaged, and committed to both personal and organizational success. A board recommendation was submitted for approval as part of the January consent agenda.

Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, Drew McMechan

Mr. McMechan shared the following updates:

- Electronic copies of W-2s are available through the employee portal. Paper copies of W-2s can be provided upon request.
- Budget season has begun. The current year amended budget (2024-2025) will be presented to the Board in February. The proposed budget for 2025-2026 will be presented to the Board beginning in April through June 2025.

Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert

Dr. Daveda Colbert shared:

- "The time is always right to do what is right." "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, "What are you doing for others?" Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.
 RESA celebrates and honors Dr. King's life and work and acknowledges that his legacy inspires us to keep going. On Monday, January 20, a communication went to the organization encouraging everyone to remain hopeful, inspired and resilient as we honor the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.
- We have an amazing year ahead of us. 2025 is here and we have a lot to celebrate and
 acknowledge that there is more work that we must do, as we remain focused on improving
 outcomes across the county. We must continue to do what we know is right.
- RESA remains committed to equity and excellence. We started off the year acknowledging and witnessing Beacon School students and staff reporting to their new building. We celebrated the grand opening with a ribbon cutting in December, but the first day of school for Beacon students and staff in their new school building was January 6, 2025. Superintendent Terry Dangerfield continues to acknowledge how thankful he is for the partnership that has allowed us to achieve opening a new school for the Beacon School community. We again acknowledge Rob McCoy, Sr. Executive Director of Operations and IT Infrastructure, for his coordination and leadership ensuring that the transition went well throughout the holiday break along with the building services team and all who helped in this endeavor. We also acknowledge retired RESA leaders Steve Ezikian and Karen Howey who started the conversation for this new school, and we thank Deputy Superintendent Kelly Bohl and Assistant Superintendent Dr. Jen Taiariol who carried the project through to the finish line, alongside the Lincoln Park team. We acknowledge all who have made this a reality. Comments resonate from Beacon students, parents, and staff about the Taylor property being transitioned into a new school for deserving scholars. Congratulations to the RESA Board for their commitment and the RESA organization for seeing it through as a partner with Lincoln Park Schools.
- Wayne County superintendents monitored the weather forecast for days leading up to
 decisions being made on Monday, January 20, 2025, for school on Tuesday and Wednesday
 January 21 and 22 due to the frigid temperatures. Superintendents take the responsibility of
 keeping students and staff safe seriously. There was a lot of care and concern taken into
 consideration for students and staff who travel to school or work on foot or travel by school

- bus or public transportation. Safety is the highest priority, which is why decisions were made to cancel school for Tuesday and Wednesday.
- The School Finance Research Foundation (SFRF) held a webinar on January 21, 2025, for the Michigan Statewide School Facilities Study: District-Level Report Overview. Individual districts are receiving their building reports January 22 through January 24. As we continue to further analyze what the School Finance Research Collaborative study reported in 2018, with updated numbers in 2021, and the transportation study released in 2022, there is excitement about the final pieces of that adequacy study playing out with the statewide school facilities study. The data is being aggregated and will be shared with the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on School Aid, House and Senate Fiscal Agencies, the State Budget Office, and the Michigan Department of Education. More information will be forthcoming as the results of the study are released.
- RESA is encouraged to see the progress of Wayne County districts. We remain committed to
 partnering with, supporting, and working alongside each of our constituents in support of
 improving outcomes for students and staff. Relationships with our constituents are extremely
 important. Being responsive to their need's matters. Modeling expectations is vital to the
 success of the county. Advocacy at the highest levels is key. Ensuring research based best
 practices and relative and timely guidance is being shared as part of our collaborative
 conversations is important.
- The Wayne County Association of School Boards general membership meeting is on Thursday, February 20, starting with dinner at 5:45 p.m. and the meeting begins at 6:00 p.m. at Wayne RESA. We will continue to encourage our Wayne County School Boards to actively participate with the Wayne County Association of School Boards (WCASB) and members to participate in the National School Board Association Advocacy and Equity Conference which is in the first week in February (February 1-4, 2025). This is encouraged for many reasons, but one in particular is to advocate for the full funding of IDEA. This is the 50th anniversary of the Individual Disabilities Education Act that passed in 1975. Currently, Wayne RESA serves a student population that includes 14 percent of students with Individual Education Plans which represents 16 percent of the state's student population with Individual Education Plans. We must continue to advocate aggressively for the full funding of IDEA or at least a minimum a plan/path to continue to increase strategically across a 10-year span so that we can continue to see ourselves beyond the 13 to15% range and continue to move towards the promise of 40%.
- Michigan Department of Education, Least Restrictive Environment visits will take place in Wayne County the week of January 27. The leadership of Dr. Jen Taiariol and the entire Special Education Early Intervention Services (SEEIS) Department is instrumental. RESA continues to embrace our relationship with the Michigan Department of Education which is stronger and even more positive in special education and early intervention, partly because of the leadership of Dr. Taiariol and the way in which she continues to work with the Michigan Department of Education. She is a fierce advocate for all children and advocates aggressively on behalf of the students, families, educators, and schools/districts in Wayne County.
- RESA continues to encourage Wayne County parents/families to enroll their four-year-olds in
 the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP). Slots are still available. We will continue to
 aggressively encourage and market programs and the support and services that we provide to
 ensure that our community-based organizations, public school academies and our local
 education agencies have students continuing to enroll. There has been media coverage about
 classrooms in Wayne County and Deputy Superintendent Beth Gonzalez served on a media

- blitz along with Oakland Schools' superintendent and the MiLEAP office to talk about the high quality, no cost programming offered in early childhood.
- The Wayne RESA Board of Education was recognized during School Board Recognition Month. Their individual and collective service and commitment to Wayne County students, parents and families were highlighted and acknowledged. Collectively, the Wayne RESA Board of Education has more than 100 years of service. The RESA Board is recognized, honored and celebrated each month, but in January in particular, the organization took time to acknowledge them by showing appreciation, and to say thank you.
